Student Spotlight

Our Student Spotlight for this issue is Rodney Miller, who is working toward a Graduate Certificate in Christian Studies, and who is spearheading our Kankakee Cohort. Rod also engages in Civil War Living History events, where he often serves as Regimental Chaplain or as Preacher. Rod leads groups of reenactors in church services that reflect what as service during the Civil War would have been like. In this setting he is able to share the message of Hope that we have in our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ with many folks who do not regularly attend a church, but are willing to sit through one of his services and listen because faith was such a significant part of the story that they have gathered together to act out.

Here is what Rod has to say about his experience here at Urbana Theological Seminary:

"I chose to start taking classes to get biblical training to equip me for ministry. I worked for 20 years in education and believe that the lord is calling me to work in a more direct or fulltime ministry at this point in my life. I have ministry experience, but I desperately need Seminary training to continue.

I appreciate the fact that each of the instructors that I have worked with here at the seminary are fully devoted followers of Christ Jesus. They speak and teach out of this passionate relationship. They also have a passion for the authority of scripture and to build up the body through equipping church leaders. Taking classes here, I have gained in knowledge of the Bible in depth, and I feel like I know what I knew before better. I have gained an appreciation for the study of God's Word. I have also built relationships with staff and fellow students that have served as an encouragement to me in my faith walk."

Too much, too little, or just right? Announcing a Continuing Education in Ministry program

This fall Urbana Seminary announces a brand new option for training. Some people don't want a degree, but wish they had more accountability to learn than what an audit provides. When auditing, you sign up to come to class and soak up the lectures, discussions, and enjoy the other students and building relationships. But you do no homework and get no grade and no credit. Starting this fall, in all Seminary classes there will be a new option. Students who want something more than an audit but less than a class, as well as a certificate proving that they took the class, will want to consider taking their learning to the next level. To sign up to take a class in this program, you register at the low audit rate, then contact the office to let them know you intend to do this for a certificate of completion. You will then pay an additional \$100, and discuss with the professor what work needs to be done. The assigned reading and reflection is designed to ensure that you gain much more than you would by simply sitting and listening passively. At the end of each course for which this is fulfilled, you will receive an official Certificate of Completion from the Seminary. Visiting Instructor Spotlight

This fall we have the pleasure of hosting Christian Psychologist Dr. Daniel Green as he teaches a modular class on Forgiveness and Reconciliation that will take place during three weekends over the course of the semester. Dr. Green has taught this class at the Evangelical Theological Seminary in Prague, where he has taught various Christian Counseling classes every summer for the last 17 years. He has also taught this class for Trinity International University, Elmbrook Christian Study Center, and the Wisconsin Center for Christian Studies. For the last 27 years Dr. Green has been the Clinical Director of New Life Resources, Inc, a Christian Counseling Center in a suburb of Milwaukee. He has written or co-written six books, including "Why Do I Feel Like Hiding?", *Overcoming Guilt and Shame*, *Overcoming Grief and Trauma*, and *Encountering Shame and Guilt*," all of which were co-written with Dr. Mel Lawrenz, retired pastor of Elmbrook Church. In the class he will be teaching for us, Dr. Green will work through various ways of understanding how forgiveness and reconciliation work, bringing together the two fields of psychology and theology. This counseling class will be helpful not only for pastors and people involved in various ministries, but will also be good for those who want to work through the ways that forgiveness and reconciliation can work in their own lives.

Tolkien Conference

Urbana Theological Seminary is pleased to announce its fourth Annual Tolkien Conference! This year's conference will be held at Hessel Park Christian Reformed Church, on Saturday Sept 19, beginning at 9:00 a.m. and ending mid-afternoon. Five speakers will take turns speaking on various aspects of Tolkien's work. This includes Rick Williams of Judah Christian School speaking on Tolkien's little-known children's story about a dog, called "Roverandom." Michael Rassmussen from Trinity will be presenting on the topic of his master's thesis, Tolkien and medieval theology. Billie Jarvis-Freeman, who teaches part time at Lincoln Christian University, will speak on the role art plays in our perception of Tolkien's characters. Our own Melody Green will be exploring Tolkien's popular poem "The Riddle of Strider," looking at how the metaphors at work in it make it applicable not only to a specific character in *The Lord of the Rings*, but to our own lives, as well. Finally, our Keynote Speaker, Dr. Charlie Starr, author of *Light: C. S. Lewis's First and Final Short Story* and popular speaker at Tolkien conferences, will be speaking on how writers such as George MacDonald, G. K. Chesterton and C. S. Lewis influenced Tolkien. Each of our conferences has had an excellent mix of scholarship and fandom, while exploring some specific aspects of the relationship between the imagination and the Christian faith. Cost: \$25. Israel in the Ancient Near East in Chicago

On Saturday May 30th an intrepid group from Champaign-Urbana headed north to visit the Oriental Institute Museum on the campus of the University of Chicago. There Dr. Ken Cuffey conducted the mix of students and seminary friends on a tour of artifacts from ancient Israel, Assyria, Babylon, and Egypt that correlate with the history and culture of the Old Testament. The collection of ancient near Eastern items at the Institute is outstanding, and the fellowship was delightful. Seeing an ancient stone relief of a king of Israel mentioned in the Bible (Jehu), decor from the palaces of Israel's nemesis the Assyrians, along with ancient altars for sacrifice truly give a richer understanding and more vivid set of "mind pictures" as you read the Bible.
