

Urbana Seminary will be ONLINE ONLY for FALL 2020

On June 26th, the Core Faculty of Urbana Seminary made the decision that all of our classes in the Fall Semester of 2020 would be offered online. The decision was made prayerfully, listening for the Lord's direction and wisdom. The resurgence of COVID-19 in so many places, and the uncertainty which this presents for schools returning to in-person instruction this Fall, pointed to this as the wise choice.

Our Lord calls us to love one another, and in that light we do not desire to be a cause for the spread of the virus. In addition, in order to focus on student success, it is best to plan a course for the entire semester either in-person or online. Rather than designing instruction for the classroom and then facing a mid-semester pivot online (as we were required to do in mid- March), the Seminary Faculty will design each class for the upcoming semester for online delivery. This allows us to uphold best practices in online course design and ensure that we maintain the highest quality of education, as is always the goal.

This does have the benefit that wherever you live, you can enroll! Whether you're in Chicago, Colorado, or Greenland, this is your chance to refresh your knowledge or get started on learning about God, the Bible, and Ministry skills. Come and join us, come and grow, come and deepen!

Meet Our New Adjuncts

This year, Urbana Seminary is adding two new adjuncts whom we want you to get to know!



This summer, we were pleased to have local pastor Chi-Ying Wang teach an in-depth study of The Book of Ephesians! Before moving to Champaign in 2019, Chi -Ying taught the Beginning Greek sequence at Trinity (Deerfield, IL) beginning in 2008. Bringing to the table her expertise as a former software engineer, she participated in the design and implementation of the

online Beginning Greek courses for Trinity, and is the coauthor of the upcoming Introduction to Biblical Greek Syntax and Linguistics Workbook, which is the companion of a textbook for first-year Greek grammar. Born and raised in Taiwan, she also preached and taught extensively in Mandarin. For years she regularly preached at churches in Illinois, and she has taught intensive courses in Mandarin for various seminaries in the US, Taiwan, and Hong Kong. She is currently serving as visiting teaching minister at Champaign Chinese Christian Church.



Our other new adjunct, Anne Alexander, has been a missionary with OMF since 1981, and from 1981-2013, she taught Missions, Discipleship Training, Journalism, Precept Inductive Bible Studies, and Bible Storytelling for adults at Christian colleges, seminaries and churches around Taiwan. She recently earned her Doctorate of Intercultural

Studies from Biola, and still serves with OMF while also volunteering for BibleTelling, a ministry that focuses on retelling Bible stories. Anne is excited to share her experience and her storytelling abilities with us. When asked what else our students should know about her, she said:

"My heart is to please God and see His people fall in love with Him over & over again! When I was in OMF Orientation Course in Singapore in 1981, I suddenly realized I loved animals but not people, and that only God could change my heart. I asked, He answered, and I'm still awed by His love flowing through me. My dog Joey helped me reach out to Taiwan neighbors from 1986-1996. Now God has given me Dash, a darling 'Teddy Bear'. You'll probably get to see Dash, who regularly reminds me when I've been on the computer too long and he needs a cuddle. God knew before CoVid that I needed a therapy dog of my own!"

We welcome Chi-Ying and Anne on board, and we hope you get to know them both soon!

The Earth |s Still

While walking the streets of Champaign this morning, I stopped to listen.

Stillness.

I thought about how this unprecedented stillness isn't just here in our quaint university town in east central Illinois, but everywhere.

Yes, everywhere.

Okay, not every city, state, region or nation has mandated a lockdown like Illinois' governor did yesterday. But, COVID-19 – and the coronavirus – has placed much of the world at an unprecedented standstill. The pandemic is affecting every inhabited continent on the earth. Churches, schools, offices, restaurants, pubs, libraries, fitness centers, community centers, tourist attractions – tranquil with an unprecedented stillness (and anxiety for many). Where humans have ceased in their hustle and frenzy, the earth is enjoying an unexpected sabbath – a year of jubilee – if you will. (e.g. the waters of Venice clearing up).

Yes, we've had many pandemics, and many more lethal than this one, as well as wars, disasters and tropical storms that have taken many, many more lives and brought more havoc and destruction than this, but for a 21st century, hyper-connected, global community to be halted as we are presently witnessing is a marvel. And, yes, for much of the majority world and global South, this kind of felt vulnerability is nothing new. As I thought about this unparalleled moment in human history for our context and for much of the world, these words flooded my mind this morning:

"Be still and know that I am God, I will be exalted among the nations." (Psalm 46:10)

What might God be saying to us in this stillness? Are we listening? How is he moving among all nations to exalt his name? The Story which God is writing in human history – his ways, his movement – are beyond us, but I believe he is speaking to us in this unique moment. He speaks and summons the earth!

Hopefully, as we are being "stilled", we aren't *more* distracted than we were before this era of social distancing and quarantining. But, thanks to the internet, we just might be. In this stillness, let's do just that and actually *be still*...

Urbana Seminary Summer 2020 has been an unqualified success in the quality of instruction, the beginning of incorporation of new adjunct faculty, and availability to students far and wide. As you can read about elsewhere in this *Hearth*, all classes will be taught online this Fall Semester as well. I'm excited that even in these distressing times, we will both continue to introduce new adjunct faculty and some brand new courses. Thus I hope many of you who live at a distance from here will join those in this area in the delightful process of learning and growing together in classes starting August 24th!
