In addition to our traditional Master's degrees and certificates, Urbana Seminary is pleased to offer **The Story Experience**, a series of concise 2 credit courses that introduce the main theological disciplines as a resource for loving God more deeply, knowing God more profoundly, and serving God more effectively.

Each spring and fall we will be offering at least one of the following classes in this program, and everyone is welcome to take any of the classes for 2 graduate credit hours, or as an auditor, or for CEUs. Courses will be taught live online, accessible from anywhere.

Anyone who takes all six classes will earn a certificate in *Experiencing God's Story*.

The Story of God's Word (This Fall, Tuesdays, 6:30-8:30 PM Central Time)

An integrative overview of the narrative of the Bible, describing the story of God's work to form a people of his own that begins in the Garden in Genesis, climaxes in the work of Jesus, and culminates in eternity in Revelation.

The Story of God (Spring 2024)

An investigation of the character of God as revealed in the story of redemption from Eden to the New Jerusalem. This story describes the God who creates, pursues, redeems, and transforms us through the triune activities of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Student Spotlight—Kezhen Zhang



My name is Kezhen Zhang. I have been an Urbana Seminary student since the summer of 2020, and anticipate graduating in the spring of 2024. If you ask me why I chose to study theology and come to Seminary, I would say it was a specially tailored course that God put into my life journey.

That journey began when the seed of faith

was sown in my heart by my mom in China, the only Christian in my family. She brought me to the church when I was little and as a high schooler to her fellowship where we studied the Bible every week. At that time, to me the Bible was only a history book full of interesting stories. I loved stories, and I used the Bible stories I learned from the fellowship in writing assignments in school. My literature teacher commended me for citing resources that were rarely used by Chinese students and even suggested my classmates borrow the Bible from me. These positive experiences prevented me from following the mainstream atheistic ideology in China. After High School I moved to the United States to study history and anthropology. I traveled back to China to be baptized in the summer of 2012, after being made aware of the existence of false teachings and the necessity of following the pure gospel in my life.

I have been a book lover since I was little and dreamed of becoming a librarian In 2016 I came to the University of Illinois to study library and information science. However, I had never connected my dream, my major, and my future, to my faith. I worked in the university library after graduation, and attended Champaign Chinese Christian Church. One day at work, I suddenly had a light bulb moment. My *church* needs a library. I talked about this idea

with the church leaders and started to serve as a church librarian. After a while, my service came to a standstill – I was unable to encourage my church people to actively use the library! Any methods I learned from my major did not work well and I was reminded of the most essential thing I learned in classes – "know your users' needs", I realized that my horizon was too narrow, focusing on "what I feel comfortable doing and what achievements I want to attain" and that I was blind to the



task of loving others and understanding *their* needs. God used the difficulties to slow down my service so that I could see the problem in myself and adjust my sight. This was the major reason I came to the Seminary – I wanted to have a deeper understanding of people's spiritual needs, including myself.

At Urbana Seminary I systematically learned theological knowledge, and also benefited from communicating with professors, independent studies, and volunteering at the Seminary library. For example, Dr. Melody Green listened to my vision and designed a book ministry independent study for me, so that I had the opportunity to see how Christians in different book occupations serve people as salt and light. I can say that my study time at the Seminary wiped away the fog from the front window, allowing me to see the light on my road.

Now I have a clearer vision of how to serve God with my profession.

In September my husband and I plan to open a book lounge in a house near campus where Chinese students can come to study, relax, or simply have a cup of free tea. The place's name will be "Breath Book Lounge (Chinese title: 一息书吧)," The name "Breath" refers to the first breath God blew into the first man that gave us a living soul. It also refers to a Chinese devotional book which can be translated as *Never Stop Praising While Still Having A Breath*. We hope to effectively use this place as a platform where non-Christians can know about our faith, and Christians can talk about applying the faith in secular society. In my time preparing for the book lounge, God keeps disciplining me to continually pray and rely on Him instead of making my own way. Please join us in praying that God will establish it according to His own will and for His Glory!


