
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
Fall Enrollment Skyrockets

Great news! This fall semester Urbana Seminary took a giant step forward as the number of students enrolling in classes doubled. Our head count of total graduate students jumped from 21 to 40, the number of full-time graduate students jumped from I to 7, and as a result the number of graduate credit hours taken almost tripled, increasing from 68 to 194. There were also 22 students enrolled in 66 credit hours at the undergraduate level. Praise God! We are here to train students, so the more we can help the better. That's our purpose at the core. Certainly we see God's hand at work!

Meet our Full Time Students

A new feature of this fall is the increase from I to 7 full-time students, as well as the admission of applicants to our degree programs. We'd like to feature our full-time students and introduce you to some of those with whom we are privileged to work.

- **Lindsey** moved to Illinois after finishing her college degree at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls to enroll in the Certificate program. Her eyes are set on missions.

- **James** is a retired professor from the University of Illinois who is highly engaged with his lay ministry in a local Episcopal congregation. His goal is to seek a Master of Arts in Religion.



The Firsts Keep Coming

- On August 24 the fall semester of training got underway.
 This is the first semester we have been able to offer the programs leading to the two new Master's degrees—the Master of Divinity (classic preparation for pastoral ministry) and the Master of Arts in Religion (good solid grounding in the basics along with a high level of flexibility to tailor the degree to different needs and interests).
- On September 16 Urbana Seminary held its first Concert of Prayer to bring the concerns and vision and praises of the school before the Lord. A Concert of Prayer describes a group of believers who meet and pray together for the same focused needs. We decided that it was important to consistently follow the Lord's example, so we invited staff, students, Board members, and Friends of Urbana Seminary to gather and pray for the school, its vision, its students, its teaching, its life, its finances, and its needs. The next one will be early in second semester.
- With the influx of new students in degree programs, we faced a new and exciting situation this fall. Around 25 students have been accepted into or are in the process of applying for one of our programs. In order to communicate with them about programs, procedures, their goals for the year, and the vision of the school, we held our first annual **New Student** Orientation on August 22.

 Excellent news from our financial aid department is that the number of applications for scholarships has

increased by three times this fall due to more students enrolling in classes and more full-time students. We give aid both to meet financial need and to honor potential, with a preference for those in our programs. Scholarship needs of undergraduates are generously met through the Evangelical Christian Union scholarship fund. However, the need for graduate students has increased considerably beyond what we have in our Graduate Scholarship Fund. Pray that God would meet these needs by supplying an additional \$9,000 beyond what we have for scholarships for fall and spring semesters.
