Hi, my name is Karen. I've taken a couple courses at the Seminary as an Undergraduate, and currently I'm a Graduate Student in the New Testament course. The Seminary has been phenomenal in my life - just teaching me about the word, who God is, and answering the tough questions I had about pieces of scripture, especially about the Old Testament, and in general. The Old Testament has always seemed a complex and intriguing book for me. The Old Testament course was really amazing - just to be able to go through all the pieces of information that always seemed somewhat contradictory and figuring out how it all fits together. It seemed so hard to understand who God was and why he ordained the things he did.

Seeing how God works through history and how He's the same through both Testaments was a big discovery for me.

I took Perspectives [in Christian World Missions] last fall, and it was amazing. It really opened my eyes to the broader world of missions. The course allowed me to see how God works through the church through various events in History and how he's raising up people for his work all over the world. It was so convicting to learn about the nonwestern world—how they are much more passionate about Christ, how much they endure, how much more they send missionaries out then the western world does. And all this was transforming in light of many areas of my life and just in general for understanding what Christianity is. It gave me a lot of impetus in my life for service abroad, for reaching unreached people, and for giving me a passion to glorify God in everything I do.

I'm starting in the Fall as a graduate student in the Master of Arts (Religion) program and I am so excited just to continue learning about the word and also get a lot of practical applications for ministry and apologetics and relationship, learning how to study the Bible and everything else. I know these are tools I will use throughout my entire life. I'm really excited and I'm thankful for the opportunity I have to study here.

# senior seminar ties it all together

For the first time, Urbana Seminary is offering its capstone course, which provides a synthesis and integration of an entire program. The Senior Seminar is designed to be taken in the final year of a student's enrollment with Urbana Seminary in order to sum up all that the student has studied over the past semesters.
