HIGHLIGHTS AND HAPPENINGS

- On December 20, we sent in our application for the next level of approval to the Illinois Board of Higher Education.
- The entire team of those who work at Urbana Seminary have met each month this year in a series of mini-retreats to sharpen our understanding of vision and calling as a school. Our hope is that we will be able to publish a strategic plan for the next several years as a result of these times of recommitment and rethinking. The discussions may also lead to some fine-tuning of the curriculum to make what we do more effective in training leaders who can study, hear, use, and share the Word of God.
- A whole new line of brochures about the school, as well as the new catalog, have been designed by a professional graphic designer, Carolyn Zimmer. The first piece, a card which introduces the Seminary and its degrees, is already in print. It looks sharp and reflects what we desire to be a pervasive commitment to quality in all that we do. Work is also underway on revamping the website.
- On April 20 the Seminary held the Spring Concert of Prayer, this time with a focus on praying for students and their lives and ministries.

From sound bites to understanding: BRUCE VOJAK


I often have felt that my understanding of scripture is as if it were a series of moderately-considered sound bites. While there are many quite meaningful key verses, stories and concepts that I carry around with me, I simultaneously sense that I lack both a broader and more in-depth understanding of scripture. My participation in a Seminary class on Ephesians, taught by Peter Spychalla this spring, has helped me to gain a richer and more synthesized understanding of this important New Testament book. Since this class is structured as a guided and interactive study of the text, being enrolled has provided me with both the challenge to dig into the text on my own throughout the week, a time to practice and learn Bible study skills on my own. There is also the safety net of having Peter there as a mentor, providing additional insight and directing discussion, as well as my fellow students there to discuss the text each Wednesday night. Perhaps the most rewarding part of the class so far has been to see the powerful and broad recurring themes and messages that Paul has woven throughout this book and how these themes and messages are so often inextricably linked with each other. They do not stand on their own as I would have envisioned them with my sound bite perspective. This has been at various times both compelling and convicting. For where I am coming from, I can not recommend a better way to move to a next level in personal Bible study skill or to a deeper and broader understanding of scripture.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH:

Building Bridges, Raising Awarness

Urbana Seminary is committed to the local church, to parachurch ministries, and to being a resource in their mission to train and equip laypeople. We desire to bridge what we perceive as an unnecessary and harmful gap between traditional theological education on the graduate level and the person in the pew. To bridge that gap and encourage people to take steps toward deepening their spiritual lives,



Urbana Seminary has created the Community Outreach program to offer training in lay settings. Since the semester began the Community Outreach program has presented seminars to serve churches and other ministries, entitled On the Road with the Apostle Paul: A Visual Tour of the Missionary Journeys, How to Interpret the Bible, and Discovering and Using Your Spiritual Gifts (Community Bible Study leaders, Chinese Christian Church, Illini Chinese Christian Fellowship) and a seminar called What's He Saying? Finding God's Will for Your Life for the broader Christian community of this area. Todd Daly addressed the Bioethics Seminar Series at Carle Hospital on the topic Methuselah Pills, Frozen Fruit Flies, and the p53 Gene: Aims and Ethics of Anti-Aging Science. Seminary faculty and staff have ministered in the pulpits of a number of local churches, as well as offered training for Bible Study leaders on John 15: Staying Connected (Windsor Road Christian), and taught a semester long Panorama of the Old Testament (Covenant Fellowship).

A CROSS SECTION OF LIFE IN SEMINARY CLASSES

What would you study the second week of April?

Have you ever wondered what students at Urbana Seminary are studying? What exactly do theological students invest their time in pursuing? We asked everyone who teaches for us this semester if they could give a brief summary of what they covered in classes the week of April 9-13, right after Easter, to give you a taste of the specifics (and maybe to whet your appetite for some of the most exciting teaching going on anywhere).

- Theology 2: The doctrine of the church, with specific emphasis on the role of women in the church (Todd Daly)
- Ephesians: The exhortations in Eph 4:17-5:21 -- walking in new life, love, and wisdom (Peter Spychalla)
- Senior Integrative Seminar: exploring questions of calling and placement, and preparing final statements on doctrine, philosophy of ministry, and personal calling. (Brett Smith)
- Preaching: How to write for the ear, not the eye, when you write your sermon. Skills for oral clarity: restatement; preview; key words; transition phrases; Scripture reading; gestures; & effective delivery. (Randy Boltinghouse)
- Gateway to Missions: Christian Community Development, transformation with regard to world need, hope and holism, and urban ministry. We will also deal with the controversial claim that missionaries destroy cultures. (Mike McQueen)
- New Testament: The epistles of Paul from his early career, especially Galatians, Thessalonians, Corinthians, Romans. (Ken Cuffey)
- **History of Christianity 2:** Developments in 19th century Protestant and Catholic life and theology, the rise of the modern missionary movement in 1792 and its impact on world Christianity in the 19th century. (Adrian Lamkin)
- Greek 2: The imperative mood and its use in select NT sentences (Peter Spychalla)
- Apologetics: the problem which evil poses for belief in an all-powerful, benevolent God; why should anyone believe in a God who allows innocent children to be abused or to suffer from terminal illnesses, or allows tsunamis to wipe thousands of people off the face of the earth? (Todd Daly)
- OT Wisdom Books: The end of Job and its theology, God's speech from the whirlwind, how Job addresses the question of innocent suffering. (Ken Cuffey)
- Field Education: students are working in a variety of placements--from preaching and teaching to facility maintenance--and reflecting on their experiences together during class reflections. (Brett Smith)
- Advanced Counseling: We covered a biblical overview of the nature of conflicts in relationships and considered the biblical perspective of and practical suggestions for conflict resolution. We also analyzed the nature of words and their impact on us, on those around us, and on those we counsel. (Min Chung)
- Classics of Christian Devotion: A student-led presentation will look at the classic work of John Bunyan, *Pilgrims Progress*. (Adrian Lamkin)

WE CALLED!

If you were a donor in 2006, you should by now have received a call, or at least a message if you weren't there (or picking up). We called! That is, our Board members called each person or family who was part of our ministry through giving. The Board wanted to do this of their own accord.
