

## an interview with joe...

#### What do you do for a living?

I work for T.I.S. College Bookstore's textbook department. I'm basically responsible for collecting and entering the information about the books each instructor would like to use, ordering those books, and, then, making sure our shelves are set up for when those books arrive.

# What degree are you getting at Urbana Theological Seminary? What do you hope to do in the future?

I am a first year M.Div. student. For me, this is a stepping stone toward the ultimate goal of a Ph.D. in the Hebrew Bible/Old Testament. I would love to be on the faculty of a university or seminary at some point, but am certainly open to other calls. In the back of my head I have this wild notion of developing a one day seminar called "A Day with the Old Testament," and then traveling around the country in a Volkswagen bus doing the seminar from church to church. Twenty-first century Christianity is confronted with the ugly monster of Biblical illiteracy. This is particularly true with our handling of the Old Testament. Perhaps the hand of God, my VW bus, and I could help in a small way to confront this problem.

# What made you decide to come to Urbana Theological Seminary?

Originally, it was convenience. My family has lived in Urbana for about 15 years and my wife works for the University of Illinois. But, in retrospect, Urbana Seminary has been an excellent decision because of its approach to theological education. Urbana Seminary tends to educate broadly, empowering the theological student to actually think and arrive at theologically sound conclusions. In my faith tradition, seminary is about indoctrination, not about faithful and rational inquiry. W.B. Yeats said that education is more about the lighting of a fire than the filling a pail. Urbana Seminary lights fires.

# What, of any, impact are your classes having on your spiritual walk, work, life?

Seminary has had the very important effect of forcing me to open theological doors that, for me, had always remained closed. For instance, I had never really wrestled with the issues of the Doctrine of Revelation until Professor Daly's Theology I class, or the encounter between postmodernism and Christianity until Professor McQueen's Culture & Ministry class, or the New Perspective on Paul until Professor Cuffey's New Testament Seminar. On the flip side, it has drastically reduced the amount of time for devotional activities. Before seminary, I faithfully prayed the Roman Catholic Liturgy of the Hours, but have not been able to keep up this practice. In effect, studying Hebrew has replaced praying Matins. This remains a concern for me and it is often foremost in my prayers and thought. It seems that I am a living example of Henri Nouwen's critique of seminary education as found in his book "In the Name of Jesus." This is disconcerting.

# Is there a group of students, instructor, or class that excites you?

T.I.S. has had the good fortune to employ a few other Urbana Seminary students (Mark French and Brian Sauder). Through them, I've really been able to form a better understanding of the faith of students a decade younger than myself.

Hebrew has the odd distinction of being both the most difficult class I've ever taken and the class I've loved the most. I am a horrible Hebrew student, but am also absolutely in love with the language. I guess this is just one of those weird seminary paradoxes that I am still trying to reconcile with and incorporate into my being.

# seminary and university as a team: environment and church leaders

Some exciting recent developments have opened a bridge for faculty from Urbana Seminary and the University of Illinois to work together on a cooperative project. Scripture is clear that we need to take good care of the world that our Father created. In the summer to come, the Seminary and select programs in the University will join together to offer a seminar for training church leaders from Illinois. This will focus on:

- Christian responsibility for care of creation as stewards, which will be taught by the Seminary (Ken Cuffey on the Biblical foundations for concern with our environment and Todd Daly with a theological/ethical perspective on the issues).
- Scientific data about the state of the global environment and practical steps that church leaders can take in order to help, which will be presented by faculty from Natural Resources and Environmental areas of study at the University.

Several meetings have already occurred to chart a course and lay the groundwork. The conversations have been animated and constructive, with an air of genuine excitement at the potential from both collaborating parties. More info on this as it develops.



# urbana theological seminary's 2006/2007 fiscal year end report

For the 2006/2007 school year, 135 men and women enrolled in one or more of our biblical studies, Christian history or thought, and practical ministry courses.

During the 2006/2007 fiscal year, we began the fall semester with 9 new program students. In the spring 3 more students joined our program bringing Urbana Theological Seminary's total program student enrollment to 27. Of these students, 10 are working toward their Graduate Certificate of Christian Studies, 8 are working toward a Master of Arts in Religion, and 9 are working toward their Master of Divinity.
