

ILLINOIS BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION

At approximately 11:30 AM on December 4th, 2007, the Illinois Board of Higher Education voted unanimously to give Urbana Seminary Degree-Granting Authority. DGA is the second and highest level of approval accorded to an institution of higher learning in the state of Illinois. This means that the whole process of an education at UTS - from applying, to the first day of class, to walking the stage to receive a degree at graduation - is fully approved by the state. It is a legal requirement that all schools in this state must go through the process to ensure the quality of what is offered. Praise God with us! We are so delighted to have attained this milestone.

I decided to move back to the Champaign/ Urbana area to get more spiritual training to prepare for missions. My plans were to go to Urbana Seminary to get the one year graduate certificate and get a degree in either nursing or teaching English as an international language as I work. Currently, I work as a benefits administrator for a business company in Champaign. Because I also work, school seems more challenging. But it's worth it. God is worth the time I spend to try to understand Him and to know Him. I pray before class or on my way to class or before I study that I would have hunger and desire to know God more. He has given me the focus and strength to be able to study.

Initially, I just saw a seminary program as a means of training in the Word to help me to be more useful and effective for discipleship and teaching overseas. But seminary has been more than an intellectual academic program. I am learning more than knowledge or facts from my professors. I get very blessed from them as they share their lives and faith lived out as they teach us the subject. In all the classes that I have taken, the professors want us to

More knowledge of God should lead to greater humility and The Old Testament is obedience. exciting. It's awesome to learn about God and how He is working in the history of the Israelites to bring the nations to salvation. As I was studying the theme of Leviticus and flipping through the book, I caught a vision of His holiness and wanted to cry and repent. It's all about God! How do we approach our holy God? We need to approach Him with holy worship and holy living. He is gracious and merciful to us. Listening to the stories of the early church from Acts to the Middle Ages is fascinating. I see God

working through men and nations to protect and spread the Gospel.

These classes have deepened my faith and helped me to know and understand God more. It affirms and deepens my conviction that there is no other way to live except to totally give it all to God to walk the narrow path. I know that I am not much. Although I may not be written in the history texts of man, God has given me the privilege to be written in His story book. He is including my little story in His big story. This is more than I can ask for. I am thankful for the privilege to be in seminary and UTS is helping me along my journey of God's little story for me. In spite of being busier and sleeping less, I am repenting more and praying more. At work, I am more gracious with others and want to do my best more often even when it's not personally rewarding and circumstances are not favorable. In the November Flame, we had mentioned completing our re-examination of our Mission and Vision. A series of mini-retreats from winter through summer of 2007 resulted in our working through all the components of how we desired to express what God has called the Seminary to accomplish. We had shared the new and more precise wording of the Mission Statement: that Urbana Seminary provides graduate theological education which prepares people for Christian ministry and leadership, equipping them to love, know, and serve God.

The Mission expresses who we are and what we do. The Vision is to capture the essence of where we are heading and what we dream of being known for. The new statement of Vision we chose is that Urbana Seminary will seek to serve God and His eternal purposes by providing an education that will be academically excellent,

faithful to Scripture, missional, and student-focused.

This contains a number of exciting facets! One of the immediate benefits of the discussion and resolution is that it has allowed us to better clarify our target audience and goals—that we are here not to reassure people of what they have always thought, but to drive them back to Scripture, to give them the tools to dig in and understand the text, and to think as Christians on their own to face unforeseen issues that will arise in the years of ministry and serving Christ ahead.
