

Looking out over those assembled that night, I could see in the front row three exceptional individuals, one from each program—recipients of a Master of Divinity, a Master of Arts in Religion, and a Graduate Certificate of Christian Studies. I sensed that these people provide proof that the Seminary is established in the programs it offers, the sense of academic quality and student involvement in their own education. God has given us a niche in the world of training people for the Lord's service that is unique and attractive.

These three also represent a new threshold for Urbana Seminary. Each started studies in Fall of 2005 at Urbana. This was the first graduating class in which the entire class was comprised of individuals who had earned their entire degree from Urbana Seminary, with no component of credit from our predecessor institution, the Christian Studies Center. These are truly our own graduates! And they represent a class with outstanding abilities and senses of calling from the Lord. I will be excited to see how God will use them in the years ahead.

I also sense that at this time the Lord has brought us to a new juncture as a school. Our focus over the past six years has been on the establishment of the highest quality programs of study for theological and ministry training, as it should have been. Now in the period ahead we must firmly establish our work with a view to its ongoing sustainability and growth for decades to come. This is the point at which we must address other issues for the longer term future, taking seriously the need to undergird our ministry with intense prayer and to build our network of financial partners. We must move as quickly as possible to create a foundation from which to work that will carry us forward.

### Summer Courses...

The summer sessions are newly underway as you receive this. There are three courses available and a solid enrollment (nearly doubling summer enrollment for 2007 - praise God!). To whet your appetite for what you could do, here are this summer's offerings:

- *History of Christianity II* taught by visiting adjunct Martin Klauber (Ph.D. in Reformation History from the University of Wisconsin), a survey of the history of the Christian movement from the Protestant Reformation in the 16<sup>th</sup> century up to the present day.
- *The Doctrine of the Atonement* a chance to sit under our own Todd Daly, Ph.D. to study the history and development of the doctrine of the atonement in the Christian faith. What exactly did the death of Christ mean? What did the cross accomplish? What does it mean to talk about atonement? Substitution? Propitiation? Explation? And what do all these have to do with the believer today?
- The Christian and the Environment: A Practical Theology of Eco-Stewardship in conjunction with the June 3-5 STEWARDship workshop, cosponsored by the Seminary and the University of Illinois, Drs. Ken Cuffey and Todd Daly will share in teaching a course that examines the biblical and theological basis for responsible stewardship of the environment. How is the disciple of Christ to care for the planet God created?

# New Testament Search... Listening to the Lord

This year Urbana Theological Seminary conducted a search to fill a faculty position teaching Biblical Studies: New Testament (at the Assistant Professor level). We received over 35 applications which we narrowed down to three. In April, we had the privilege of bringing in three talented candidates. Each gave a lecture on their topic of choice in NT studies and interviewed with faculty, staff, students and board members. In response to the Lord's leading in the search process and with gratitude for the provision God has made in a talented adjunct pool, we have decided not to pursue a hire for a position in New Testament this year. We will cover the needed classes with enthusiastic and willing adjuncts. We plan on resuming the process at a later date.
