

GET TO KNOW ASH SCARBROUGH (M.DIV STUDENT AND GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Ash spent four homeless days on the streets of Chicago. Hear in his words how this impacted his life...

When I began this journey with Jesus Christ five years ago, I struggled to understand what "faith" was. I found the definition proposed by the author of Hebrews (11:1) beyond my personal comprehension, and concluded, as many have before, that faith was little more than engaging in the belief that Jesus was who He said He was. But imagine my surprise when I discovered that the original word for faith meant more than believe, it meant trust. If faith means trust, then there is a deeply personal element to Christianity that calls us out of our self-established security and into the dangerous act of emulating Jesus.

Following in the footsteps of Christ became more difficult for me when I came to a harsh reality. Jesus had no place to lay His head. I decided to follow him to the streets as a homeless man. So, two friends and I changed into our most tattered clothes, carrying only a Bible, a pen, and some paper, and we took to the streets of Chicago. We agreed to live on the streets for four days, relying only on the grace of God for food, water, safety, and anything else we would need. We would each be on

our own, like so many of the homeless men and women I have met before; and we would meet together for a short time each night to encourage and pray for each other. We had two goals: To understand God's heart for the poor, and to learn what it means to "pursue first His Kingdom and His Righteousness" when we had nothing of our own.

For four nights and three days we slept on the cold hard pavement of the city streets. We quickly discovered the value of human life as we were pushed from street corner to street corner, reminding us of the common perception that problems disappear if you can not see them. Most people would pass by us, diverting their gaze so as not to see. Others would yell at us asking what our problem was and why we were so pathetic. Yet, very very rarely, one kind soul would sit and talk, asking about life and offer whatever they could spare. The evening hours gifted us with cold biting winds from off Lake Michigan as well as swarms of mosquitoes searching for food; and sleep was a dear friend with which we were rarely acquainted. Hungry, tired, and suffering from social atrophy (one of us even was sprayed down with pepper spray), we embraced

the nothingness of the streets and found faith instead of despair.

To our surprise we ate regularly. True to His Word (Matthew 6), God provided us with food and clothing. He gave us warmth and love, but it was never where we expected it. When in need it was not the businessman who helped... but another homeless man, giving all that he possessed. When we were walking through the cold rainy streets in the twilight hours, we were not sheltered by the haves... we were invited to share a blanket with the have-nots, as we passed by a homeless community. Homeless men and women took care of fellow homeless men and women. because it seemed like nobody else would. We would take what little money we had and buy as many items from the McDonald's dollar menu as we could... And then give all of them away before we sat down to eat a burger ourselves. I have seen Jesus Christ, and if you need to find Him, he resides at the corner of Union and Roosevelt in Chicago, Illinois... alongside his "street family". We feel called to return to the city streets to bless Christ, as He has blessed us. And we will learn what it means to "trust" him as we rely on Him for our every need.

WHAT IS THIS NEW PARTNERSHIP?

BROTHERTON FOUNDATION GRANT CREATES A NEW SCHOLARSHIP FUND

In August, the Brotherton Foundation of New Jersey awarded a grant of \$25,000 to begin an endowment fund for scholarships for Urbana Seminary program students. The goal will be to increase the endowment over the next years and build it to the place where the earnings on the endowment will year to year provide one full tuition scholarship for a deserving student in one of our programs. This first year we will have an application and selection process during the spring semester, hope to announce the recipient at Graduation, and award a partial tuition scholarship for the fall.

SEMINARY ADDS THREE LECTURERS

In an effort to creatively and economically boost the resources available to our students, Urbana Seminary has created a new faculty position, the Lecturer. The Lecturer is a part-time faculty member, hired on an annual basis, who will regularly teach a part-time load of courses (usually one per semester) and take on some administrative roles to help the Seminary. These roles include assignments to advise students, participate in the evaluation process of the Seminary, coordinate the graduation ceremony, or serve as chaplain to the student body. We have hired three for this academic year: **Mike McQueen** (Lecturer in Missions and Evangelism); **Mike Shea** (Lecturer in Hebrew and Bible); and **Judy Webb** (Lecturer in Worship). Our goal will be to continue to build this resource for the Seminary and its students through adding more Lecturers in future years.

A NEW HIRE AND A BIG EVENT

In September, Urbana Seminary appointed one of our M.Div. students, **Ash Scarbrough**, to the position of Graduate Assistant with responsibilities especially in the area of development. Ash will be helping the Seminary connect with donors and encourage people to be involved with the ministry of giving. In particular, this semester he is responsible to oversee the famed *Student Call-Through*, in which our students contact everyone on our mailing list that we are able to reach. This effort lets us connect you with people who are direct beneficiaries of the Seminary's ministry, affords you the chance to ask them questions and find out what Seminary life is like, and get more excited about the vision of the Seminary.
