

On Saturday, May 21st Urbana Seminary celebrated its 11th annual Commencement. The accompanying pictures give some idea of the delightful day, and the variety of graduates who received the Graduate Certificate, the Master of Arts in Religion, or the Master of Divinity! All the graduates are of note—they have already engaged themselves in a diversity of ministries and are actively making use of their training. One to specially congratulate is Melvin Leach, whose M.Div. represents the culmination of 12 years of classes—he began in 2004 and steadily progressed with one class at a time. Thus the ranks of the Urbana Seminary Alumni Association swelled further this year, past 50, and we praise God for each of these alums—how they have grown as they studied, and how God will use them in the decades to come! Erasmus and the Bible Revolution

At noon on Wednesday, June eighth, Urbana Seminary held a lecture combined with a visit to the Rare Book room on U of I's campus that was attended by 55 people. M.Div student Merle Klein describes the experience from his perspective:

'Erasmus and the Bible Revolution' was a fun and informative event. Professor Joe Thomas spoke about the life and work of Erasmus, the man who compiled the Greek New Testament as we know it. His work impacted Luther and other Protestant Reformers. As a seminary student, I was pleased to learn that Erasmus did not learn Greek until he was about 30 years old. If he can learn Greek at 30, then maybe it's not too late for me to do something meaningful. Following the talk, we all walked over to the Rare Book and Manuscript Library at the University of Illinois to tour their Erasmus exhibit. There we had the chance to view some of Erasmus' works and hear more about them individually.

I attended the event on short notice: a friend invited me a couple hours beforehand, and I am glad I went. I enjoyed hearing about this historical figure that I knew little about, and his life and impact on Christian history. I also enjoyed seeing many friends from the community. This was a great lecture and an awesome exhibit made even better by the company of students and friends of the Seminary.

Oriential Institute Tour written by Pearce Durst.

On a beautiful Saturday afternoon in July, Dr. Ken Cuffey and Dr. Melody Green led a comprehensive, three-hour tour at the University of Chicago's Oriental Institute—a museum dedicated to the study of the ancient Near East. With fifteen people participating in the tour, we started the afternoon in prayer, and received a handout with a chronological timeline of Israel—a historical outline of what we were about to witness in the flesh through the artifacts. While it's often easy for the Old Testament to feel like a distant recollection of a faraway time and place, Dr. Cuffey's initial comments, combined with the presence of the Old Testament artifacts that were yet to be seen, helped to bring the Old Testament stories to life. And that was just the beginning.

Looking at the first exhibit, the human-headed winged bull that once adorned the throne room of Sargon II loomed above us all. Standing an imposing sixteen-feet and weighing forty-tons, our expert guide explained the prowess and power the Assyrians asserted through their sculpture. We were transported back millennia to the capital of Assyria, where the old king, regally sculpted in tall stone, raised his hand in greeting. Depicted as wearing a spike-topped fez lined with a pair of ribbons, a long robe ornamented with rosettes and squares, fringes and beads, and holding a lotus flower, the details in the sculpture brought history to life. All in attendance saw these invading neighbors of the Israelites in a different light. To imagine being an Israelite, seeing these intimidating sculptures for the first time, it must have been terrifying.

Standing in another room, the pivotal geographic position and importance of "Har Megiddo" (Mount of Megiddo) became more fully understood. Dr. Cuffey contextualized its many artifacts, such as the "horns" of the Jewish altar, the modest triangle and palm leaf design of the Jewish column capital that contrasted with Xerxes' grandiose columns, and the idol of Baal. We gazed up at the Pharaoh who had a foreboding serpent protruding from his forehead, and then at full-sized replicas of the Rosetta Stone and Code of Hammurabi. To have seen these artifacts in person, knowing that many came straight from the Old Testament, was to feel the living presence of God. Dr. Cuffey suggested that we could use these tangible histories to reinvigorate familiar Sunday School narratives. We solemnly paused and contemplated this merging of past and present.

After ending the tour, the group grazed through the gift-shop, stopped by the Seminary Co-op bookstore, met for dinner in Hyde Park, and drove back. Upon reflection, I realize that the collection of monuments and artifacts was relatively small compared with what once had been. Just glimpsing what I had seen means that the Old Testament can never be read the same again.
